RETRACTED ARTICLE: The Long-Term Health Impacts of Repeated Flood Events: A Review

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The Editor and Publisher have retracted this article because substantial portions of the text and content were duplicated from a previously published article by Stephenson et al. [2014]. The content of this article is therefore not sufficiently original and is redundant. The concern was brought to the journal's attention by Dr Ben Howard, an author of the 2014 publication. The corresponding author, Abdul Rasool Khoso, was contacted and explained that his role primarily involved editing and collaboration and that he was unaware of the similarity at the time of publication. He agrees with this retraction. The other authors have not responded to correspondence regarding this retraction.
